Ninth Rome Symposium Give Account of the Hope that is in you

Apologetics for Today February 15th-17th 2019

Organised by the Emmanuel Community with the Pontifical Redemptoris Hominis Institute (Lateran University)



Presentation

From February 15th **to February 17**th **2019** the Emmanuel Community, in cooperation with the Pontifical Redemptor Hominis Institute (Lateran University), organises a symposium with the title: *Give Account of the Hope that is in you: Apologetics for Today*.

For over fifteen years, the *Rome Symposium* has brought together people who wish to reflect on the challenges of the New Evangelisation. The ninth Symposium intends to study the challenges of apologetics – the theological science of arguments in favour of the faith and of its credibility.

Many individuals and communities have undertaken works of evangelisation and acquired a rich and varied experience, but the reflection on what makes such missionary praxis convincing for human reason has rarely been set down or drawn together. This lack of development can be a hindrance to furthering the mission.

Within Catholic circles there is a crisis in apologetics. Prior to the time of the Second Vatican Council apologetics developed unevenly. It was often thought that providing 'arguments that held together' would be enough to obtain conversions, and those who did not convert could consequently be suspected of bad faith. In short, conversion was confused with the simple conclusion of a line of reasoning. The clear limits in this approach led to an opposite reaction: thinking that conversion was a purely irrational, supernatural and inexplicable experience, having nothing to do with the arguments of reason. This led to a catechesis and to pastoral programmes for youth and young people founded on emotiveness and group dynamics, where the intellect was left unfed. This happened precisely at a time when dominant culture became subjectivist and increasingly corrosive for the faith. The pendulum swung from apologetic rationalism to sentimentalist irrationalism.

It is time to think out an apologetics adapted to our contemporaries, taking account of the specific expectations of men and women today, and of the characteristics of a postmodern society sometimes termed "liquid"1.

The Symposium will look at several themes: how did the great witnesses in history proceed (St. Paul, Blaise Pascal, Newman); what reasons for believing come from science; how can we announce the kerygma today; what is the relationship between conversion as an experience and understanding it through intellect; how can we speak about faith to Muslims; what dialogue can we have with evangelicals; what does Pope Francis teach us about how to speak for today...

As is customary in the Rome Symposium, keynote speeches will be complimented by testimonies giving account of the theological intuitions that might explain why these witnesses' initiatives are fruitful and convincing.

The Symposium will be translated in three languages: English, Italian and French.
